# **Educational Intervention Services**

Verbal working memory helps children hold onto sounds, understand sentences, and follow stories while reading. Weaknesses in this skill can make reading frustrating, leading to struggles with sounding out words and remembering information. Parents can help by playing memory games, breaking information into small parts, using visuals, rhymes, and songs, strengthening listening skills, and reading together daily. Encouragement and support are key. If difficulties persist, a speech and language therapist can provide additional help.
